## Course Description

South Korea has undergone various changes with regard to the correlation between national security and the media. First, democratization in the 1990s invited many actors into the security policymaking process by unveiling the realm of national security, which had been regarded as the exclusive area for security professionals. Then, globalization and the Internet brought about post-Cold war social changes to South Korea while North Korea's threat was still present. Lastly, the era of social media opened a way for various non-expert citizens and netizens to register their views and anti-governments themes on security.
